Survey Results: Attitudes to nano-ingredients in sunscreens

Survey commissioned by Friends of the Earth Australia and carried out by The Australia Institute. *Note: Base size for all results n=1,294.*

Hundreds of Australian sunscreens and cosmetics now contain manufactured nanoparticles, or "nanoingredients". These are extremely tiny particles 8,000 times smaller than the width of a human hair.
